What is Credit for Prior Learning?

College credit awarded for skills and knowledge gained outside of traditional college coursework.

Military: Joint Services Transcripts

- ACE Credit Recommendations

Workplace: Industry Recognized Certificates, Licenses, Portfolios

- Apprentices, Journey Workers, Working Adults

Other: Credit by Exam, Standardized Exams (AP/IB/CLEP), Portfolios

- High School, Noncredit, Adult School, ROP, Contract Ed, Lifelong Learners

What Problem Are we Solving?

1. Apprentices and journey workers are not aware they are eligible for college credit that could open new opportunities.
2. Colleges often do not know who their apprentices are, what trades they are in, where they are in their program, and what CPL they qualify for.
3. Statewide we need current data on our apprentices by college, trade, region, progress, retention, etc.

Apprenticeship Sprint Goals

Goal 1 — Upload apprenticeship students to the MAP platform to make them visible by trade, college, and progress in real-time to colleges & training partners.

Goal 2 — Build CPL crosswalks and degree pathways

Goal 3 — Implement outreach to journey workers with CPL offers on accelerated pathways

Goal 4 — Develop AI-enhanced tools to optimize CPL awards and program retention and completion

- CPL for License (credit or noncredit)
- Apply to AS, BS, College Cert.

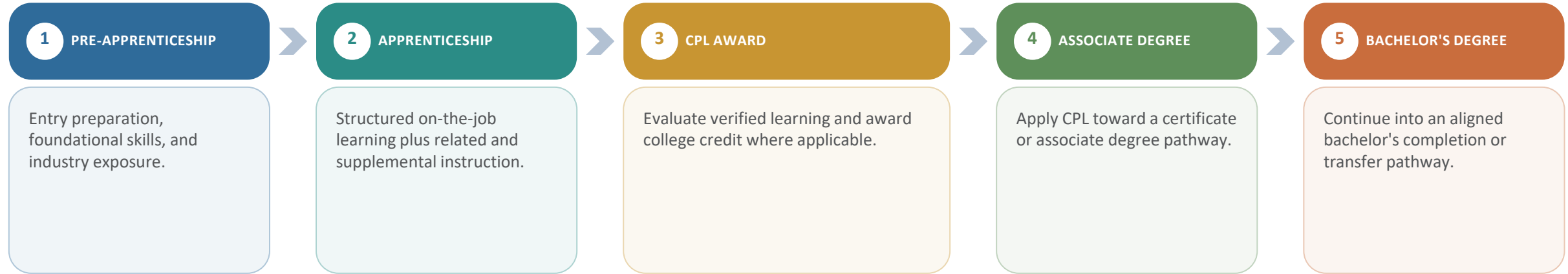

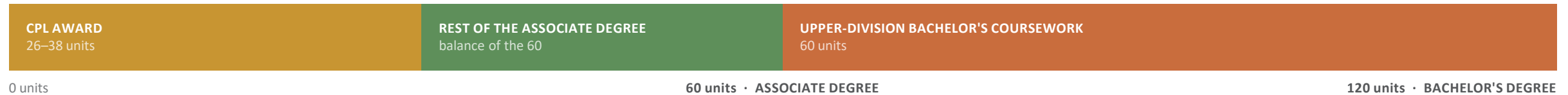
- CPL for coursework (credit or noncredit)

One road. Every trade.

Pre-Apprenticeship → Bachelor's Degree. What changes by trade is the college partner, the certificate and the number of units — not the road.

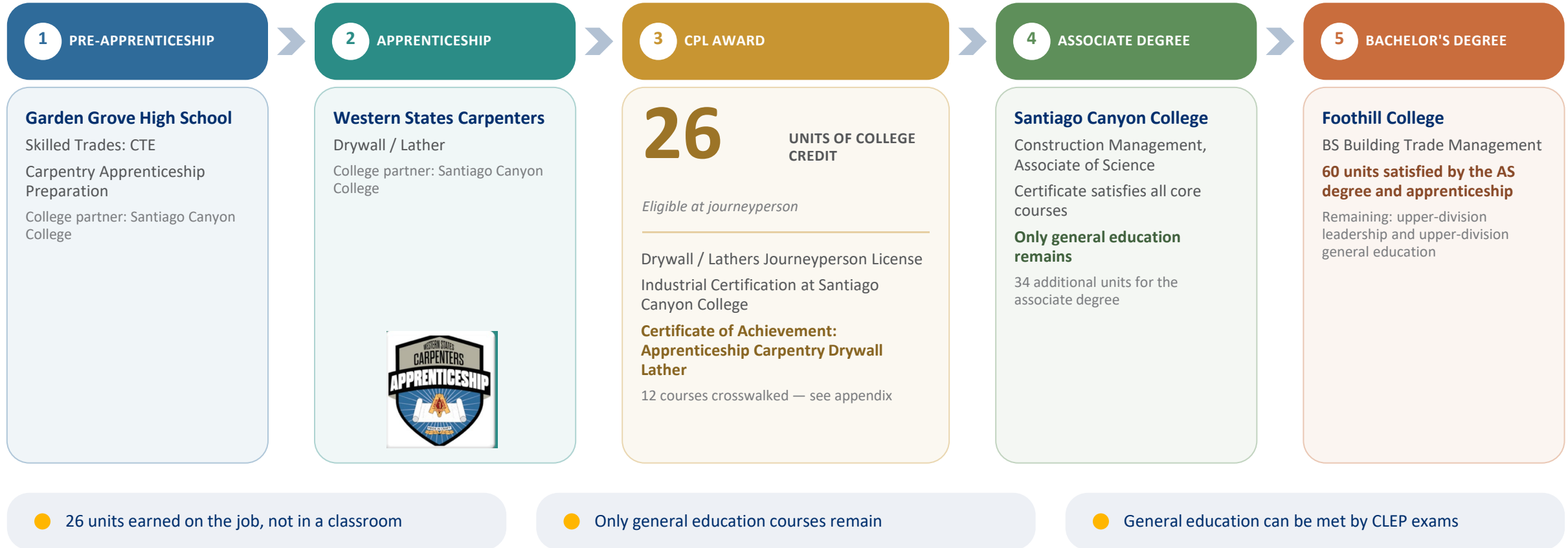

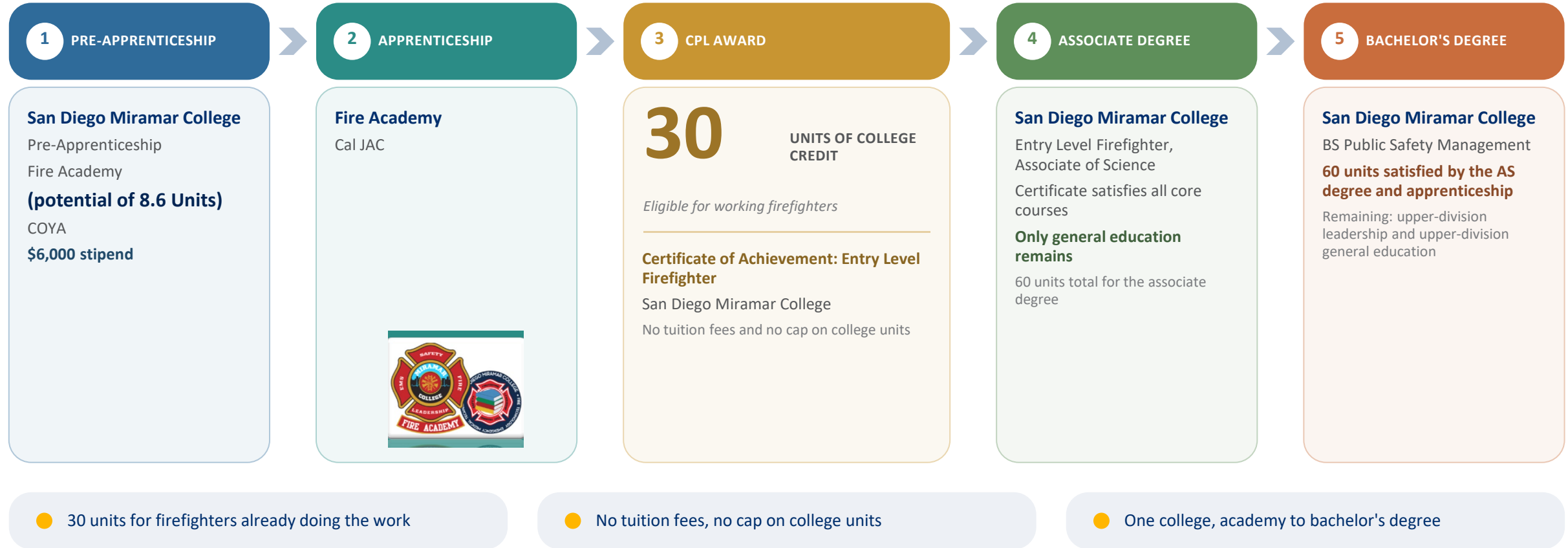

What is **Credit for Prior Learning?**

Credit for Prior Learning (CPL) is the process for awarding college credit for **validated college-level skills and knowledge** gained outside of a college classroom.

Scaling Apprenticeship CPL



- Step 1: Curriculum is Already Approved
 - Apprenticeship Training is already aligned to course credit. Academic rigor and skills verified by CCCCCO process.
- **Step 2:** Meet with Apprenticeship CPL Team to discuss goals for your apprentices.
- **Step 3:** Create a strategy to career advancement and promotions pathways to your apprentices.

HOW TO READ THIS

Each row is training the apprentice has already completed, matched to a college course the college has already approved.

Nothing here is new curriculum. The crosswalk is what turns completed apprenticeship training into transcribed college credit.

The pathway slide cites 26 units eligible at journey person. The courses making up the difference ran off the bottom edge of the original graphic — confirm the full list before this page is shared.

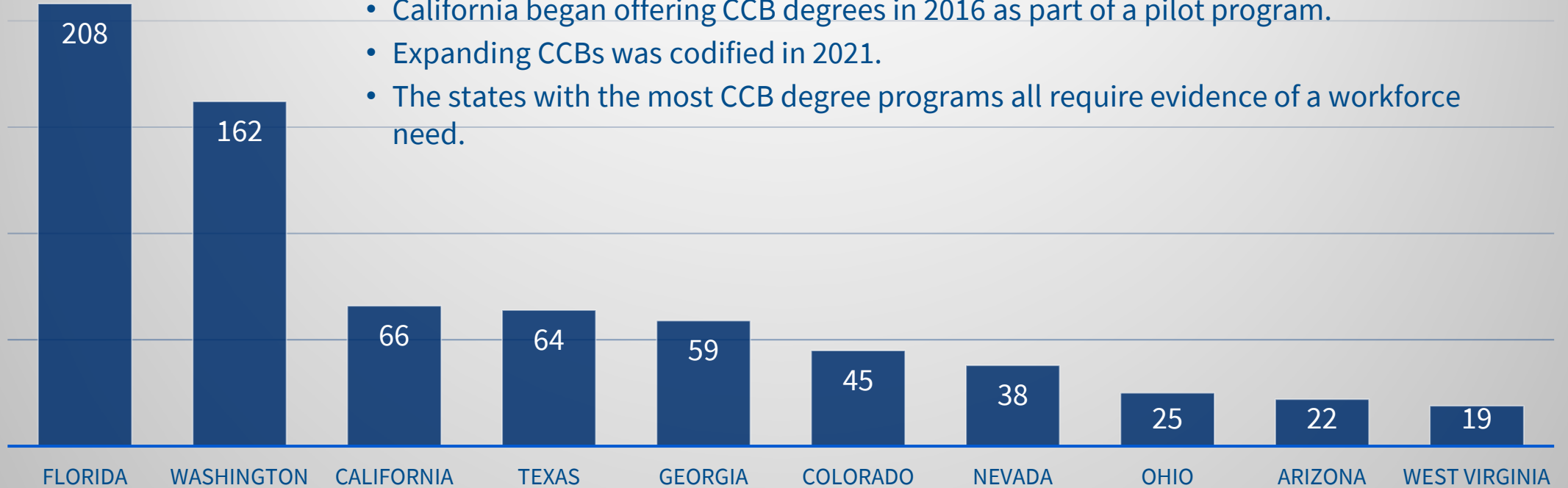

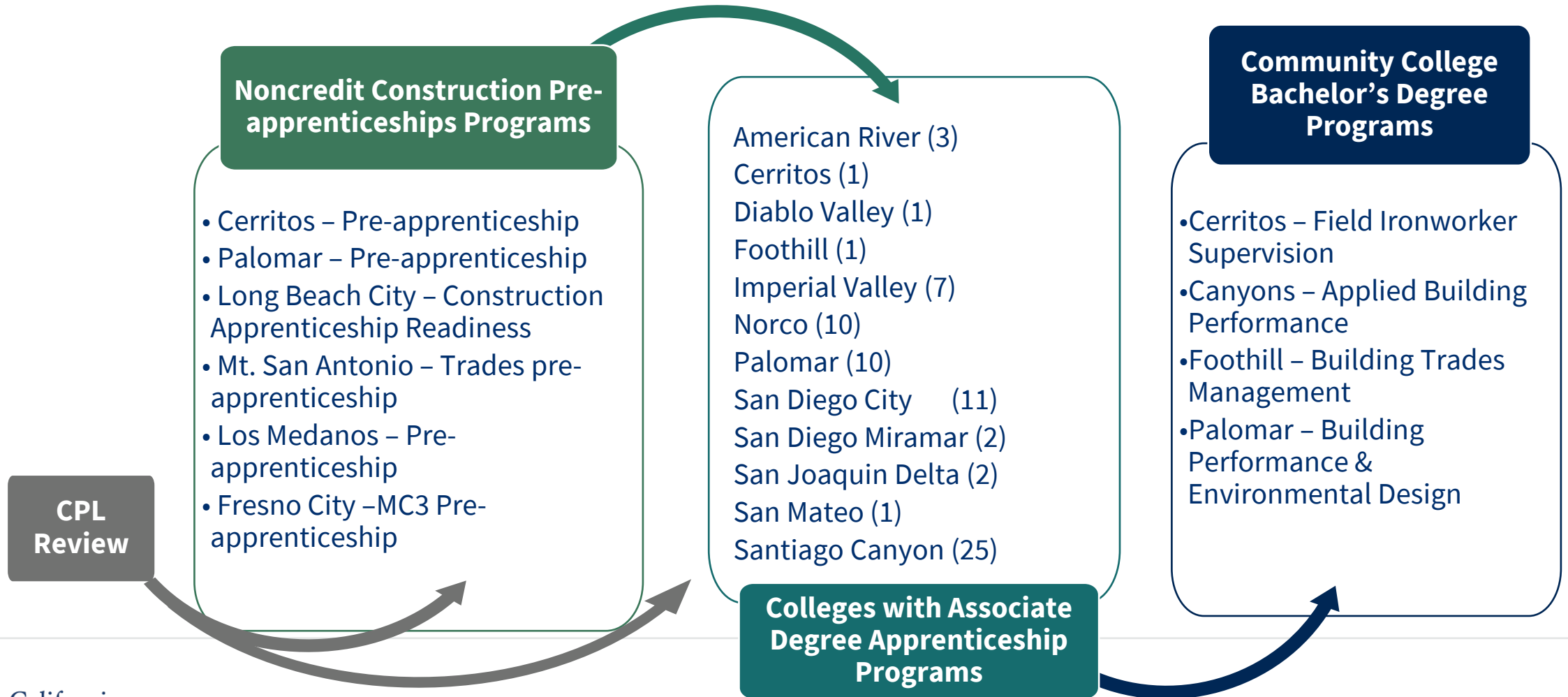
